# Golf Club to Close Temporarily for Repairs

Here at the Mooresville Golf Club, we strive to provide everyone with an outstanding golf experience. Since the re-opening of the club in October 2016, the course has been in excellent condition.

Unfortunately, mother nature was not kind to the course this winter as well as many other courses in North Carolina and South Carolina. Many of these courses are experiencing severe "winter kill" which has affected their greens, fairways and roughs.

Winter kill is injury to turfgrass that occurs through a variety of possibilities such as ice suffocation, crown hydration or low-temperature injury.

Our professional maintenance staff have done everything possible to protect and prevent winter kill from happening here, but the consistent cold weather took its toll. As you may recall, the club was closed 29 days during December - January with temperatures below 20 degrees, and sometimes lower at night.

For the long-term health of the course we must make significant repairs, and these repairs will affect course play. The following is the repair efforts done so far and an estimated timeline and action plan going forward:

The greens on holes #2, #4 and #18, and the front of the driving range tee were sprigged last month. This will allow new grass to grow in these areas hardest hit.

On Monday, June 11 the club will temporarily close to repair the rest of the winter kill damage. These repairs include sprigging holes #11 and #18, and sodding all of the weak areas around tees and greens.

Weather permitting, the club will re-open on Sunday, July 1. Thank you for understanding the importance of this issue. If you have any questions, please do not hesistate to call the Club and speak with me.

# National Safety Month 2018

Every June, National Safety Month focuses on reducing the leading causes of injury and death at work, on the road, in our homes, and in our communities. During National Safety Month, the National Safety Council calls attention to common safety risks to help prevent injuries and accidental deaths.

This June, Mooresville Fire-Rescue encourages everyone to be safe during recreational activities. In 2016, there were 11,900 firework-related injuries treated in U.S. hospitals.

Mooresville Fire-Rescue reminds everyone of facts and safety tips to remember:

- The majority of injuries annually from fireworks are from smaller devices, like fountains, sparklers, spinners or poppers.
- Handheld sparklers, while popular, are the primary cause of most 3rd degree burns each year. These sparklers burn at tempartures up to 1200 degrees Fahrenheit. In comparison, wood burns at 575 degrees and glass melts at 900 degrees.
- Always use fireworks outdoors and in a clear area away from buildings and vehicles.
- Never shoot fireworks of any kind near pets. Most pets, including dogs and cats, have much more sensitive hearing than humans. Keep this in mind during any firework activity.

If you plan to use legal fireworks:

- · Store all fireworks in a cool, dry place.
- · Always have a bucket of water or water hose nearby.
- **Never** shoot fireworks from objects, such as metal or glass containers.

Another popular summer activity is grilling. Gas or propane used in grills is highly flammable. Each year, approximately 30 people are injured during gas grill fires or explosions.

To reduce the risk of fire or explosion, consumers should conduct routine safety checks:

- · Check grill hoses for cracking and leaks.
- · Always use a grill at least 10 feet away from your house or any building. Never use a grill indoors.
- · Keep gas containers upright in a cool, dry place.

# Water Saving Landscape Tips

Plants filter water and air of harmful bacteria, cool the environment, and reduce energy costs. Listed below are steps to increase your water efficiency and help your plants survive droughts or water restrictions.

### Step 1: Pick plants that will thrive.

Match your landscape design to your site and soil. Include a variety of plants including shrubs, trees, annuals, perennials and turf.

Step 2: Prepare the site. Healthy soil has a balanace of air and water. It also supports plant growth by providing essential nutrients.

Step 3: Apply mulch. Mulch puts the finishing touch on flower beds, protects tree roots, and



keeps soil cool. Keep mulch away from trunks or crowns of plants.

Step 4: Water efficiently. Use only enough water to maintain plant health and limit waste. Install drip irrigation in landscape beds. Apply water at dawn or dusk to minimize evaporation.

**Step 5: Capture rain water.** Use water conservation items, such as rain barrels, to capture water for other uses.

# The Truth About Road Upgrades (Part 3)

This is part three of our series on planning for our transportation network and how these upgrades are funded. These upgrades are typically handled as Town-funded projects (through bonds or direct funding), State-funded projects or they are built as part of a developer proposal.

In this installment, we're going to detail about the most common type of financing for road construction: roads built as part of development proposals.

Town staff first assesses a proposed development's impact to our road network. This study is called a Traffic Impact Analysis (TIA). TIAs are required when certain threshold triggers are reached. This study is prepared by a third-party professional engineer who recommends the needed road improvements. The developer is then required to implement those recommendations as part of their development construction.

# **Improvement**

Straight Ahead

Mooresville's requirements for submitting a TIA are different than the North Carolina Department of Transportation's (NCDOT) requirements. Mooresville plans for a more urban population where NCDOT plans for both urban and rural areas. So, the limits for triggering a TIA study in Town are generally more stringent.

The majority of road improvements that happen throughout Town occur within this type of "developer-driven" scenario. By requiring developers to pay for the road improvements created as part of their project, it lessens the burden that would otherwise be placed on taxpayers.
